What does it mean to form my conscience?

Catholics have a long tradition of engagement in the public square. Sometimes that engagement requires making difficult moral decisions that impact our own lives and those of others. Our conscience can help guide the decisions we make. The Second Vatican Council guides us: "Always summoning [one] to love good and avoid evil, the voice of conscience can when necessary speak to [one's] heart more specifically: do this, shun that" (*Gaudium et Spes* 16). However, our conscience doesn't just come to us when we are born. We must work throughout our lives to form it through prayer, learning, and conversation.

How do I form my conscience?

It takes time to form our consciences so that we can make well-reasoned judgments about particular, real-life situations. The Church teaches that it is important to work continually on conscience formation so we can be prepared to make decisions whenever the opportunity arises. Some specific ideas to form your conscience are:

- 1) Begin by **being open to the truth** and what is right.
- 2) **Study Sacred Scripture** and the **teaching** of the Church.
- 3) **Examine the facts** and **background information** about various choices and be discerning in where we gather information.
- 4) **Prayerfully reflect** to discern the will of God (*Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship*, no. 18).

Additionally, it is important to consider how our community of faith can help us form good consciences through some of these steps:

- 1) Seek the **prudent advice** and **good example** of trusted leaders and others to support and enlighten our conscience.
- 2) Learn about the **authoritative teaching** of the Church.
- 3) Pray for the **gifts of the Holy Spirit** to help us develop our conscience.
- Regularly partake in an examination of conscience to hear God's voice in your life.¹

Doing the work of forming our consciences can seem daunting. Fortunately, we have many church teachings that can help us in this important task. *Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship* is an important resource for U.S. Catholics and helps us prayerfully reflect on how we can apply Church teaching in our civic life. "Conscience is not something that allows us to justify doing whatever we want, nor is it a mere "feeling" about what we should or should not do. Rather, **conscience is the voice of God resounding in the human heart**, revealing the truth to us and calling us to do what is good while shunning what is evil."²

Here are some questions for further reflection:

- 1. When has my conscience guided me to "do good and avoid evil"?
- 2. What are some key resources I can use to form my conscience?
- 3. Forming conscience is a "lifelong task." What do I do to *regularly* form my conscience? What more should I do?

DEACON'S CORNER

When Bartimaeus calls out to Jesus, the crowd around him tries to silence him. Yet Bartimaeus persists, calling out more loudly and with greater urgency. He will not be silenced or deterred from getting Jesus' attention. We notice how quickly the crowd's reaction changes when Jesus calls for Bartimaeus. Those who sought to quiet him now encourage him.

When Jesus restores Bartimaeus's sight, no elaborate action is required. (In other healing stories in Mark's Gospel, actions accompany Jesus' words). In this instance, Jesus simply says that Bartimaeus's faith has saved him. Throughout Mark's Gospel, the success of Jesus' healing power has often been correlated with the faith of the person requesting Jesus' help. For example, it is because of her faith that the woman with the hemorrhage is healed. When faith is absent, Jesus is unable to heal; we see this after his rejection in Nazareth.

Once his sight has been restored, Bartimaeus follows Jesus on his way to Jerusalem. In Mark's Gospel, Bartimaeus is the last disciple called by Jesus before he enters Jerusalem. Bartimaeus hears that Jesus of Nazareth is passing by, but he calls out to Jesus using words of faith— "Son of David." Many in Jesus' time believed that the anticipated Jewish Messiah would be a descendent of King David. Bartimaeus's words prepare us for the final episodes of Mark's Gospel, which begin with Jesus' preparation for the Passover and his triumphant entry into Jerusalem. As Mark has shown us in our readings over the past few Sundays, however, Jesus will be the Messiah in a way that will be difficult for many to accept. Jesus will show himself to be the Messiah through his suffering and death.

EL RINCÓN DEL DIÁCONO

Cuando Bartimeo Ilama a Jesús, la multitud que lo rodea intenta silenciarlo. Sin embargo, Bartimeo persiste, llamando más fuerte y con mayor urgencia. No se dejará silenciar ni disuadir de llamar la atención de Jesús. Notamos cuán rápidamente cambia la reacción de la multitud cuando Jesús Ilama a Bartimeo. Aquellos que buscaban calmarlo ahora lo alientan.

Cuando Jesús le devuelve la vista a Bartimeo, no se requiere ninguna acción elaborada. (En otras historias de sanación en el Evangelio de Marcos, las acciones acompañan las palabras de Jesús). En este caso, Jesús simplemente dice que la fe de Bartimeo lo ha salvado. A lo largo del Evangelio de Marcos, el éxito del poder sanador de Jesús a menudo se correlaciona con la fe de la persona que solicita la ayuda de Jesús. Por ejemplo, es debido a su fe que la mujer con la hemorragia es sanada. Cuando falta la fe, Jesús no puede sanar; vemos esto después de su rechazo en Nazaret.

Una vez que le ha devuelto la vista, Bartimeo sigue a Jesús en su camino a Jerusalén. En el Evangelio de Marcos, Bartimeo es el último discípulo llamado por Jesús antes de entrar en Jerusalén. Bartimeo oye que Jesús de Nazaret pasa por allí, pero lo llama con palabras de fe: "Hijo de David". Muchos en el tiempo de Jesús creían que el Mesías judío esperado sería un descendiente del rey David. Las palabras de Bartimeo nos preparan para los episodios finales del Evangelio de Marcos, que comienzan con la preparación de Jesús para la Pascua y su entrada triunfal en Jerusalén. Sin embargo, como nos ha mostrado Marcos en nuestras lecturas de los últimos domingos, Jesús será el Mesías de una manera que será difícil de aceptar para muchos. Jesús se mostrará como el Mesías a través de su sufrimiento y muerte.

Lording It over the Rest

Most of us have heard of the contrast between "Christology from below" and "Christology from above." This opposition sneaks into most theological discussions, whether they are about dogma, scripture, morality, mission, or salvation.

What would it be like if we exercised our above-ness, our authority, in the manner of the God we profess to believe in?

Most of us are not theologians, but we can still sense what it is all about. The "above" emphasizes the divinity of Christ, the transcendent; the "below" emphasizes the full humanity of the Jesus of history.

Christology from above is the "old" way of thinking. It presumes that God, from above, enters history in Jesus, the eternal Word made flesh. Its strongest insights support our intuitive recognition of human inadequacy. It demands an admission that we are not enough. It calls for intervention and assistance from a reality beyond our own.

In its deficits, Christology from above so fixes on the divinity of Jesus that he looks like some kind of organic automaton, manipulated by a divine nature that knows everything in advance and feels nothing in actuality. All is fixed, tidy, and predicted. All is planned, neat, and efficient. Jesus is so utterly different from us, so remote and unapproachable, that we imagine him moved to compassion only by the pleading of his mother.

An equally oversimplified version of Christology from below stresses his humanity so much that you start wondering about that divinity stuff—whether Jesus pre-existed as the Word, whether he did miracles, whether he was raised from the dead, among other things.

It is easy for us to foul it all up, especially since we have big problems with notions of "from above" and "from below." Those who are above are the top dogs. They call the shots. They lord it over the rest of us. They pull the strings. When we feel below, we tend to resent those above. Or wish we could get to their status. Then we could dominate. Then we could control things.

Most of our notions of authority are rooted in this supposition. Those who have it, lord it. They take the first place. They put us in our place. Those who do not have authority easily resent it or hunger for it. (If only we could call the shots.)

There seems to be a strong tendency, consequently, to resist the authoritative aura of Jesus—although almost everyone who encountered him acknowledged his authority in word and deed. If we have nagging suspicions about "above-ness," we may insist on a Jesus from below. Little that we are, it is not pleasant to imagine anything greater than us. We love the below—as long as it can aspire to greatness and power. Even Jesus could make it as a self-made man.

Paradoxically, Jesus was very unlike us—both in his above-ness and his identity with our lowliness. Not only is he unlike us in being God, he is unlike us in being human. After all, we tend not to be very good at being humans, much less gods.

We construe our humanity in terms of mighty aspirations. But the human Jesus aspired to smallness. Oddly, even his divinity sought to be emptied out.

The <u>Letter to the Hebrews</u> reaches for this paradox. We have a "great" "high" priest. But he was strangely compassionate, fragile, and subject to the very trials we abhor. <u>Isaiah</u> warned of the fact. This savior would be afflicted, would suffer, and would even bear guilt. We want no afflictions, no suffering, and will admit no culpability. "For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but one who was tempted in every way that we are, yet never sinned." (<u>Hebrews 4:14</u>)

This is a strange fix. Like Zebedee's sons, we aspire to sit at his right and left, but we do not know what we are asking for. It is a cup of pain and suffering. It is an emptyingout. It is a descending.

The great joke on us is that the mighty God above goes down below, even below us, proud of ourselves for not needing anything other than ourselves.

What would it be like if we exercised our above-ness, our authority, in the manner of the God we profess to believe in? "You know how among the Gentiles those who exercise authority lord over it them: their great ones make their importance felt. It cannot be like that with you. Anyone among you who aspires to greatness must serve the rest; whoever wants to rank first among you must serve the needs of all. The Son of Man has not come to be served but to serve—to give his life as a ransom for many."

People in authority—even the churchly kind—may love exercising it. But they mistake the authority, the above-ness of God. If we feel excluded from authority, we may crave it. But we misunderstand the authority of Jesus.

Those who are above should go below. So, it was and is with our God. Those who are below need not hunger for the heights. We need only enter more deeply into what we are, our humanness, to receive from the One above the message that even in our smallness the grandeur of love is revealed.

PRELIMINARY CASE STATEMENT

For many years, Our Holy Redeemer Parish has welcomed all who walk through its doors, educating the Catholic community with the knowledge and love of God and of the Gospel. Our beloved church has adapted and expanded to the needs of parishioners in order to remain a thriving oasis of faith and community.

Today we find ourselves in an exciting moment in our parish's history. As we look forward to the future, we recognize the need to renovate our church and school. The proposed necessary projects for the church and school have been carefully identified.

CHURCH INTERIOR - \$623,731

- Repair interior walls and floors that were damaged before the roof replacement, by rainfall and faulty HVAC system.
- Refinish kneeling pads and pews.





SCHOOL ROOF - \$166,100

- Replace the roof to prevent damage to the 100 years old front and main body of the school building.

SCHOOL

WINDOWS AND DOORS - \$453,525

 Replace and upgrade the 40-year-old, worn out and rusted, original doors and windows.



David, have pity on me." Jesus stopped and said, "Call him." So they called the blind man, saying to him,


